The real 'bigots'

We are writing to further clarify the record on the Workplace Religious Freedom Act, following up on your article "NCJW bucks coalition in opposing religion bill" (July 1).

Although we fully support the idea of ensuring an employee's freedom to wear religious garb or take time off for religious holidays, we share the National Council of Jewish Women's serious concerns about the part of the bill that enables employees to opt out of work assignments if they have only a "temporary or tangential impact" on the ability of the employee to perform the job. The "bigots" are hardly the wise women of the National Council of Jewish Women (as Marc Stern of the American Jewish Congress accuses NCJW of being) but instead are the employees who dare impose their narrow religious beliefs in such a way as to endanger the rights and lives of others.

The solution is a compromise bill that leaves in protections for wearing religious garb and taking off religious holidays but does not have broad language that could lead to police officers not protecting abortion clinics or pharmacists refusing to fill prescriptions for emergency contraception.

The Workplace Religious Freedom Act imports new, broad, and untested standards into the law at a time when this administration has succeeded in filling the federal courts with judges who have firmly established records of hostility to women's rights. Religious beliefs cannot provide an excuse to violate firmly established rights or to endanger women's health and lives. The stakes are too high to pass these standards into law, especially where a compromise bill could protect some important rights without endangering others.
