

## State Child Care Assistance Policies: Idaho

- **Income eligibility limit:** In 2011, a family of three in Idaho could qualify for child care assistance with an annual income up to \$23,184 (125 percent of poverty, 43 percent of state median income).
- Waiting list: Idaho had no waiting list for child care assistance as of February 2011.
- **Parent copayments:** In 2011, a family of three with an income at 100 percent of poverty (\$18,530 a year) receiving child care assistance paid \$177 per month, or 11 percent of its income, in copayments.<sup>1</sup>
- **Reimbursement rates:** In 2011, Idaho's reimbursement rates for child care providers serving families receiving child care assistance were below the federally recommended level—the 75<sup>th</sup> percentile of current market rates, which is the level designed to give families access to 75 percent of the providers in their community.
  - Idaho's monthly reimbursement rate for center care for a four-year-old in the Boise Metro Area (Region IV)<sup>2</sup> was \$492, which was \$110 (18 percent) below the 75<sup>th</sup> percentile of current market rates for this type of care.
  - •Idaho's monthly reimbursement rate for center care for a one-year-old in the Boise Metro Area (Region IV) was \$594, which was \$73 (11 percent) below the 75<sup>th</sup> percentile of current market rates for this type of care.
- Tiered reimbursement rates: In 2011, Idaho did not pay higher reimbursement rates for higher-quality care.
- Eligibility for parents searching for a job: In 2011, Idaho allowed parents to continue receiving child care assistance while searching for a job only until the end of the month in which they lost their previous job. Idaho did not allow parents to qualify for child care assistance while searching for a job.

1 The state determines copayments based on the cost of care; these copayments were calculated assuming that the family was purchasing care at the state's maximum reimbursement rate for licensed, non-accredited center care for a four-year-old.
