

The Wage Gap Over Time: Hispanic Women

American women who work full time, year round are typically paid only 78 cents for every dollar paid to their male counterparts. But the wage gap is even worse Hispanic women—among full-time, year-round workers, Hispanic women typically make only 56 cents for every dollar paid to white, non-Hispanic men. It has been more than 50 years since the passage of the Equal Pay Act and in that time we've seen women make huge strides forward in the labor force. Yet, more than 50 years later, the wage gap still persists. Since the passage of this landmark legislation, how much progress have Hispanic women made?

In 1974, the earliest year for which data are available, a Hispanic woman working full time, year round typically made only 49 cents for every dollar paid to her white, non-Hispanic male counterpart. By 2013, the most recent year for which data are available, this figure stood at 56 cents—just over seven cents less than it was nearly four decades before.
