
The Wage Gap Over Time

American women who work full time, year round are typically paid only 77 cents for every dollar paid to their male counterparts. This past June marked 50 years since the passage of the Equal Pay Act and in that time we've seen women make huge strides forward in the labor force. Yet, 50 years later, the wage gap still persists. Since the passage of this landmark legislation, how much progress have women made?

In 1963, a woman working full time, year round typically made just 59 cents for every dollar paid to her male counterpart. The wage gap was 41 cents. In 2012, the most recent year for which data are available, a woman working full time, year round typically made just 77 cents for every dollar paid to her male counterpart. The wage gap was 23 cents – just 18 cents smaller than when the Equal Pay Act became law. It's been stuck at 77 cents for the last decade.
