National wage gap calculated by NWLC is based on 2015 Current Population Survey, Annual Social and Economic Supplement. "What a Black woman makes for every dollar a white, non-Hispanic man makes" is the ratio of Black women's and white, non-Hispanic men's median earnings for full time, year round workers. "Lifetime losses due to wage gap" or the "Lifetime Wage Gap" is what a Black woman would lose, based on today's wage gap, over a 40-year career. Figures are not adjusted for inflation. Earnings are in 2015 dollars. Ranks based on unrounded data. "Age at which Black women's career earnings catch up to white, non-Hispanic men's career earnings at age 60" assumes all workers begin work at age 20. Assuming white, non-Hispanic men have a 40-year career, this is the age at which Black women are able to retire with the same lifetime earnings as their male counterparts. Black women in both surveys are those who self-identified as Black or African American. White, non-Hispanic men in both surveys refer to those who have self-identified as white but who are not of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin.
