Q3 The next series of questions is about the issue of sexual assault in schools. When a survivor of sexual assault, or a person who has been sexually assaulted, and their assailant are both students at the same school, it can create a hostile environment that interferes with a student's right to pursue an education where they will not be sexually harassed or discriminated against. When schools do not address harassment after a sexual assault, it makes it even harder for a survivor of sexual assault to concentrate or feel safe at school. This may lead them to drop out, while the person who assaulted them may feel emboldened to strike again. On the other hand, when schools protect survivors of sexual assault they are empowered to stay in school, perpetrators are deterred and campuses are safer for all students. Q4 Do you strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree or strongly disagree that a school should discipline a student if the school finds after an investigation that the student more likely than not raped or sexually assaulted a classmate? Discipline can vary based on how severe the conduct was and the danger the student poses to the survivor of the assault or to other students. For example, discipline could mean removing an assailant from class or campus, or suspending or expelling the student from school.

Q5 Now I'm going to tell you about a few laws and policies that protect students who have been sexually assaulted, and ask whether you support or oppose these laws. Title IX is a law that protects the educational rights of survivors of sexual assault, and makes sure someone who has been sexually assaulted can go to school in a safe environment where they will not be harassed by the person who assaulted them or by other students. Q6 In 2011, the U.S. Department of Education sent a letter to colleges clarifying their responsibility to support students who have been sexually assaulted and who report the sexual assault to their school. This means schools must provide academic support like tutoring or counseling, allow dorm changes, and separate the student who was sexually assaulted and the assailant if an investigation finds that the person accused of assaulting them more likely than not committed the act. Q7 College students who have been sexually assaulted have the option of reporting their assaults to their school, to the police, to both or neither. But some lawmakers want to force students who have been sexually assaulted to report sexual assaults to the police. These laws take control away from survivors of sexual assault and from colleges that have a responsibility to protect students. Having the option of whether and how to report a sexual assault allows survivors of sexual assault to regain control.
