National wage gap calculated by NWLC is based on 2020 Current Population Survey, Annual Social and Economic Supplement. "What Latinas make for every dollar white, non-Hispanic men make" is the ratio of women's and men's median earnings for full-time, year-round workers. Earnings are in 2019 dollars. The "wage gap" is the additional money a woman would have to make for every dollar made by a man in order to have equal annual earnings. Ranks based on unrounded data. People in both surveys self-identified as either male or female. Latinas in both surveys are those who self-identified as being of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin. Latinas may be of any race. White, non-Hispanic men in both surveys refer to those who have self-identified as white but who are not of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin.
